COUNTY HOSPITAL

Doctors Ed Ryan and J. L. Price appearing on behalf of the Shasta-Trinity Medical Society present the following letter:

"TO THE SUPERVISORS OF SHASTA COUNTY

On Monday, January 10, 1949 at the regular meeting of the Shasta, Trinity County Medical Society, the following resolutions were voted and passed.

On the approval of the supervisors of Shasta County, the Medical Society would contribute their professional services free of charge to the County Hospital under the following conditions:

- 1. Organization of a rotating staff comprised of the members of the Society to cover all medical and surgical services found in the Hospital.
- 2. All present or future County Health Officers must meet the approval of the Shasta, Trinity County Medical Society before being appointed to office.
- 3. Admissions, during the working day hours, to the County Hospital would be subject to the approval of the Welfare Investigator. Emergency admissions may be made at any time and, as soon as feasible, the case would be in-

vestigated by the Welfare Department. If found to be entitled to County care, such care will be given. If the case meets the financial status of a private hospital, services rendered by the County Hospital will be paid for at the level of a private hospital until the case can be transferred to such a hospital.

It is the feeling of the Shasta, Trinity County Medical Society that the only successful answer to the problem of handling indigent patients is by the above methods.



WHEREAS, on September 14, 1948, the Governing Board of Shasta Union High School District of Shasta County deemed it advisable to call, and by resolution and order of said Governing Board duly and regularly passed and adopted and entered on the minutes of said Board on said day, did call an election to be held on October 19, 1948, in said District for the purpose of submitting to the electors of said District the question of issuing and

selling bonds of said District in the amount of One Million Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$1,750,000); and

By motion duly seconded and carried, deed of Right of Way from Arthur A. and Stella A. Nicolet to the County of Shasta is accepted and ordered placed on record.

By motion duly seconded and carried, deed of Right of Way from Jens and Ethel Pederson to the County of Shasta is accepted and ordered placed on record.

AUDIT OF COUNTY BOOKS

On motion of Supervisor Turner, seconded by Supervisor Chatham and passed by unanimous vote, the proposal of Faulkner, Oakes & Faulkner to audit the books, records and financial transactions of Shasta County for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1949 and ending June 30, 1950, at a total cost of \$800.00.

ANDERSON SEWER ASSESSMENT DISTRICT AGREEMENT

On motion of Supervisor Meeker, seconded by Supervisor Plumb resolution is passed by unanimous vote accepting the agreement submitted by Ernest A. Wilson, for Kirkbride, Wilson Harzfeld & Wallace, providing for employment of said firm to represent the Board of Supervisors in the contemplated program for public improvement (in re: Anderson Sewer Assessment District), to be financed by special assessment and assessment bond proceedings.

COURT REPORTER - EQUIPMENT, ETC.

Court Reporter Eleanor C. Parkin appears before the Board and requests an added appropriation to her budget (capital outlay) for the purchase of Dictaphone equipment, with allowance on the equipment to be turned in.

She also requests permission for the janitor to wall off a portion of her office for use as a dictating room.

CLARK CREEK BRIDGE

County Road Commissioner Ernest D. Breuning reports that the Clark Creek Bridge on County Road 44-C is in an emergency condition and should be prepared at once.

By motion duly seconded and carried, resolution is passed declaring an emergency condition to exist on the Clark Creek Bridge and authorizing repair of said bridge at once by day labor under the supervision of the Road Commissioner.

ROAD PETITION - FALL RIVER MILLS

Petition is read from residents of Fall River Mills residents requesting the inclusion within the county road system of a street leading from South Main Street in Fall River Mills to Casy's Fall River Mill.

By motion duly seconded and carried, the petition is granted and the road in question is taken into the county road system, subject to obtaining of deed to Shasta County for the right of way and subject also to the approval of the Road Commissioner.

BRIDGE ON KVCV LANE

Mr. Carl Evans reports that the bridge on KVCV Lane in Bonnyview tract has been rendered impassable by the last rain. He states that six families are served by this bridge and that it should be repaired at once. The matter is referred to Road Commissioner Breuning.

HOSPITAL FARM LAND

Mr. Carlo Cerro presents invoices of vegetables delivered to the county hospital since August 29, 1949, a total of \$101.75 and explains the oral agreement under which he farmed about two acres of land of the county hospital farm and paid the county in a share of the vegetables.

On motion of Supervisor Meeker, Seconded by Supervisor Turner and passed by unanimous vote, Mr. Cerro is given permission to continue to farm approximately two acres of land of the county farm, as heretofore, payment to be made in vegetables furnished to the county hospital and the district attorney is directed to draw up an agreement. Mr. Cerro is advised to file a report quarterly of the vegetables furnished.

FRENCH GULCH LIGHTING DISTRICT PETITION

Petition is read requesting the formation of a lighting district with the same boundaries as the French Gulch Fire District. District Attorney Frank W. Shuman advises continuance until further information can be obtained regarding the type of district best fitted for the area. Supervisor Turner is to investigate and report.

SELF-SERVE GASOLINE STATIONS

PLANNING COMMISSION RESOLUTION

Resolution is read from the Shasta County Planning Commission requesting the Board of Supervisors to prombit the erection of commercial signs on county property. After discussion, the matter is taken under advisement until January 3, 1950.

CANCELLATION OF TAXES ACTION RESCINDED

On motion of Supervisor Plumb, seconded by Supervisor Chatham and passed by unanimous vote, the resolution passed on November 5, 1949, cancelling taxes (pursuant to the provisions of Section 4986 of the Revenue and Taxation Code) affecting the property of Estella M. Loomis, deeded May 16, 1949, to the State of California and recorded in Book 244, Page 263 of the official records in the office of the County Recorder of Shasta County, is hereby rescinded.

MERGER OF SCHOOL DISTRICTS

Petition to merge Gas Point Elementary School District of Shasta County with Cottonwood Union Elementary School District of Shasta County and Petition to Merge Middle Fork Elementary School District of Shasta County with Cottonwood Union Elementary School District of Shasta County are read. Recommendation of County School Superintendent Lucy Hunt that the Merger be granted is read.

On motion of Supervisor Plumb, seconded by Supervisor Chatham, resolution is passed by unanimous vote granting petitions to merge Gas Point and Middle Fork Elementary School Districts with the Cottonwood Elementary School District.
