	Note: Work conducted between October 15 th and May 1 st requires the submission of a Wet Weather Plan.

- If removal of trees may be included in your project, please contact CAL Fire regarding Timber Harvesting Plans.
- County Wet Weather Plan applies (see handout)
 - OR -

For projects where any of the following apply, the wet weather plan shall be prepared and certified by a registered civil engineer experienced in erosion control, a certified professional soil erosion and sediment control specialist, or a soil scientist certified by the American registry of certified Professionals in Agronomy Crops and Soils.

- ✓ Any portion of the grading is associated with engineered fill or fill is greater than 12". Special inspections required (i.e., compaction testing).
- ✓ The grading work is in excess of 250 yd³ of earth material, 10,000 ft² of surface area, or greater than 2% average slope.
- ✓ The area to be graded is within 50 feet of a watercourse or has the potential to impact or alter any watercourse, natural or manmade, whether intermittent or year-round.
- ✓ The grading project requires other agency permits (CA Regional Water Quality Control Board, CA Department of Fish and Wildlife, United States Army Corps of Engineers).
- ✓ The project is a commercial project and is within the Shasta County mapped MS4 area.
- ✓ The grading project is defined as a major projects per Shasta County Code section 12.12.020 definitions and not exempt for the California Environmental Quality Act process. "Major Project" permits shall be required for any grading which will involve (1) the movement of more than 2,000 yd³ of earth: (2) the disturbance of more than five acres of earth material; and/or (3) is defined as a discretionary permit (excludes grading permits for detached single-family dwelling located on one Parcel).
- Projects that will disturb one acre or more or whose projects disturb less than one acre but are part of a larger common plan of development that in total disturbed one or more acres, are required to obtain coverage under the General Permit for Discharges of Storm Water Associated with Construction Activity from the CA Regional Water Quality Control Board. The following shall be submitted to Shasta County with the application for grading:
 - ✓ the WDID number associated with the Construction General Permit for the project.
 - ✓ A Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP), prepared by a certified Qualified SWPPP Developer.
- For projects within the county MS4 area the following documentation shall be submitted to the County with the application for grading:
 - ✓ Post construction Best Management Practices (BMP's)
 - ✓ Projects proposing 2,500 ft² to 5,000 ft² of impervious surface area evidence that runoff will be offset.
 - ✓ Projects proposing more than 5,000 ft2 of impervious surface area results from the <u>State Water</u> Resources Control Board SMARTS database.

Shasta County Code (Chapter 12.12 – Grading, Excavating and Filling) regulates grading within Shasta County. The purpose of this chapter is to promote and protect the public safety, convenience, comfort, prosperity, general welfare, and; the County's natural resource by establishing minimum requirements for grading, excavating, and filling.

If you plan to cut or remove, or both, timber for the purpose of sale, barter, exchange, or trade or for the conversion of timberland to land uses other than the growing of timber, you will need a State approved Timber Harvest Plan (Harvest Document such as, THP, Exemption, Emergency Notice, or Non-Industrial Timber Management Plan) as per Public Resource Code (PRC) 4581.

"PRC 4581. Necessity of timber harvesting plan

No person shall conduct timber operations unless a timber harvesting plan prepared by a registered professional forester has been submitted for such operations to the department pursuant to this article. Such plan shall be required in addition to the license required in Section 4571."

The cutting or removal, or both, of timber for <u>commercial purposes</u> must be performed by a License Timber Operator (LTO) as per PRC 4571(a). Commercial purposes is defined in PRC 4527.

"PRC 4571. Necessity of license.

(a) No person shall engage in timber operations until he (/she) has obtained a license from the board (Board of Forestry)."

"PRC 4527. Timber operations; commercial purposes; criteria.

- **(a) (1)** "Timber operations" means the cutting or removal, or both, of timber or other solid wood forest products, including Christmas trees, **from timberlands** for <u>commercial purposes</u>, together with all the incidental work, including, but not limited to, construction and maintenance of roads, fuel breaks, firebreaks, stream crossings, landings, skid trails, and beds for the falling of trees, fire hazard abatement, and site preparation that involves disturbance of soil or burning of vegetation following timber harvesting activities, but excluding preparatory work such as treemarking, surveying, or roadflagging.
- (2) "Commercial purposes" includes (A) the cutting or removal of trees that are processed into logs, lumber, or other wood products and offered for sale, barter, exchange, or trade, or (B) the cutting or removal of trees or other forest products during the conversion of timberlands to land uses other than the growing of timber that are subject to the provisions of Section 4621, including, but not limited to, residential or commercial developments, production of other agricultural crops, recreational developments, ski developments, water development projects, and transportation projects."

If your project involves the conversion of timberland to land uses other than the growing of timber, the property owner shall file an application for conversion as required per PRC 4621(a). Property owners may be eligible for a Conversion Exemption per Title 14, California Code of Regulations (14 CCR) 1104.1 if they meet specified criteria. Examples of conversion activities include, but are not limited to, residential or commercial developments, production of other agricultural crops, recreational developments, ski developments, water development projects, and transportation projects.

"PRC 4621. Application for conversion; procedure, form, fees and content to be prescribed.

(a) A person who owns timberlands that are to be devoted to uses other than the growing of timber shall file an application for conversion with the board. The board shall, by regulation, prescribe the procedures for, and the form and content of, the application. An application for a timberland conversion permit shall be accompanied by an application fee, payable to the department, in an amount determined by the board pursuant to subdivision (b).

If you intend to convert timberland to land uses other than the growing of timber, contact a Registered Professional Forester for consultation.
