Know the Facts: Housing

DID YOU KNOW?

- In 2015, 18.8 million U.S. renter and homeowner households paid more than 50% of their annual incomes for housing.
- In 2018, to be able to afford a Fair Market Rent (FMR) two bedroom rental in the U.S., an earner needs to make \$22.10 per hour. In California, that rises to \$32.68 per hour, while in Shasta County an earner needs \$17.60 per hour.
- In the U.S., 70.3% of households earning under \$15,000 a year pay more than 50% of their income for housing.
- A family with one fulltime worker earning the minimum wage cannot afford the local fair-market rent for a two bedroom apartment anywhere in the United States.
- From 2014 to 2016, two bedroom rental rates in Shasta County decreased 7.3% while the U.S. rate of inflation rose an average of 1.4% in 2016.

DEFINITION:

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) defines affordable housing as housing that costs no more than 30% of the household's annual income.

Fair Market Rents (FMRs) are gross rent estimates. They include the shelter rent plus the cost of all tenant-paid utilities, except telephones, cable or satellite television service, and internet service. The current definition of FMR used is the 40th percentile rent (the dollar amount below which 40% of the standard-quality rental housing units are rented).

The Rent Burdened population includes households that are paying more than 30% of their income toward housing costs.

The Severely Rent Burdened population includes households that are paying more than 50% of their income toward housing costs.

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KEY POINTS:

- Less than half (41.0%) of Shasta County renters live in affordable housing, according to the HUD definition.
- Forty-six percent of California households are rented. Of these, 28.7% are Severely Rent Burdened.
- Thirty-eight percent of Shasta County households are rented. Of these, 59% are Rent Burdened.
- Forty percent of Shasta County homeowners with a mortgage exceed the HUD affordable housing definition.

POLICY IDEAS:

- Develop more affordable housing opportunities.
- Develop and maintain efficient and effective rental assistance programs.
- Support a mix of housing for all income groups.
- Encourage a mixture of housing types (single-family attached/detached, condominiums, townhouses, duplexes, garden/conventional apartments) through zoning ordinance and planning practices.
- Require the use of energy conservation features in the design and construction of all new residential structures to increase energy efficiency and reduce utility costs.
