CSBG Eligible Entity Management Accomplishments

In 2022 the leadership team for the Shasta County's Housing and Community Action Agency continued to implement a department-wide reorganization. The intent of the reorganization was to be more effective at administering its programs. This had programmatic benefits as well as personnel and operational benefits. Programs were centralized into categories of tenant assistance programs; the homeless continuum of care and homeless data administration; housing development and special projects; and business operations. Senior analyst positions were created to increase leadership over specialized workgroups, which created more leadership opportunities for staff. In addition, direct-service staff was reclassified to a job classification that would allow greater flexibility to work between programs as necessary. This created increased capacity for inter-program learning and collaboration within the department, which historically took a siloed approach to its programs. Leadership staff increased capacity in department operations and development, while improved communication and engagement with staff was aimed at enhancing cohesion in program delivery.

While improving internal operations, staff and management actively sought opportunities to improve collaboration with external agencies and County departments. One of our 2022 most notable regional collaboration efforts was the implementation of the Homeless Coordinated Entry System. The tracking of data has allowed us to present this information to help in the ongoing planning with COC partners and within the housing department. This approach to addressing homelessness required collaboration with the Continuum of Care advisory groups in its seven-county region. Agencies that provide services to homeless and at-risk individuals within the counties of Shasta, Siskiyou, Modoc, Del Norte, Lassen, Plumas, and Sierra were provided regular training and support to establish the Coordinated Entry Activities; manage individual risk-assessment data, and connect homeless and at-risk individuals with available housing interventions. The County is currently exploring options to consolidate our department under the Shasta Co. Health & Human Services and as of December 2022 there has been a transition in leadership. which is working on assessing/studying the consolidation impact(s). Lucy Hernandez, CAA Consultant has been supporting the Interim-leadership, board, and staff to train and assist with compliance needs to ensure CSBG grant requirements are ontrack. At this time, the staff is being trained and internal capacity is being developed through T/TA on CSBG requirements.

Innovative Solutions Highlights

Due to COVID-19 impacting many residents, during 2022 the Eviction Prevention and Economic Assistance (EPEA) program continued to be offered, by using CSBG CARES funding to help individuals and households that were affected by the social, economic, or physical impacts of the pandemic. The EPEA provided assistance to income-eligible households with past due Mortgage and Utility payments, legal fees, educational or counseling services, Extra Curricular activities for children, and emergency food assistance. This program has been successful in meeting the needs of low-income residents and vulnerable populations—even though this program is funded through May 2022, the funds were depleted in the first quarter of 2022.

In order to broaden the scope and increase utilization of CSBG CARES funding throughout the community, sub-recipient agreements with seven non-profit agencies provided a range of services to the most vulnerable populations including those who are homeless, elderly, foster youth, and fleeing domestic violence. Through this partnership with community agencies, we were able to serve many residents/individuals impacted by the pandemic. This program continued through the first quarter of 2022, as many individuals in the community continued to be affected by the social, economic, and medical impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. The CARES funding made such a difference for many individuals/households in the community.

State and CSBG Eligible Entity Continuous Improvement

Our focus in 2022 was to Improve data collection by expanding our community engagement and our internal processes to increase the collection/input process. Internally we supported community needs, along with ongoing collection of customer satisfaction surveys, this has allowed our agency to focus on the primary identified need in this community and align it with the primary programs that we administer. Throughout 2022, the leadership team sought to improve utilization of its tenant assistance programs to broaden its assistance to low-income households. In the Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) program, payment standards were adjusted to provide increased assistance to enrolled families. Moreover, the limitations in the local affordable housing stock were evaluated, and the Department fostered opportunities for partnering with housing developers through the use of Project Based Rental Assistance Vouchers. By the end of 2022, there were multiple housing projects in various stages of proposal, approval, and development. We look forward to new housing projects moving forward to increase housing options and to increase inventory for affordable housing for residents, low-income households and vulnerable populations.
