Dear Chief Neal:

The 2020-2022 biennial inspection of the Shasta County Probation Department's Juvenile Rehabilitation Facility (SCJRF) and River's Edge Academy (REA) has been completed. A preinspection briefing was held on May 4, 2022. A full comprehensive inspection was performed from June 21st through June 24th, 2022.

The complete Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC) inspection report is enclosed and consists of the following: this transmittal letter; Title 15 Procedures checklists, outlining applicable minimum standards for juvenile detention facilities; a Physical Plant Evaluation, outlining applicable Title 24 minimum standards; and the Living Area Space Evaluation (LASE) for both JRF and REA facilities, summarizing the physical plant configuration and outlining the rated capacity of the Juvenile Rehabilitation Facility and the River's Edge Academy.

Please refer to the Title 15 Procedures checklists for a summary of all relevant minimum standards, indication of compliance or noncompliance, and information that was used to determine compliance.

LOCAL INSPECTIONS

In addition to the biennial inspection, Title 15, Section 1313 and its authorizing statute also require local inspections conducted by the following local authorities:

- County building inspector or person designated by the Board of Supervisors
- Fire authority having jurisdiction
- Local health officer
- · County Superintendent of Schools
- Juvenile Court
- Juvenile Justice Commission.

Results of those inspections are considered a part of this report. The dates of the local inspections may be found in the accompanying Procedures Checklists.

Scope of the Inspection

The inspection consisted of a review of the Juvenile Rehabilitation Facility's and River's Edge Academy's Policy and Procedure Manuals¹, a site visit to review operations, physical plant and relevant documentation, and interviews with administration, facility staff, youth, and collaborative partners. During the inspection, we evaluated consistency between policy and practices.

BSCC INSPECTION

Title 15, CCR Minimum Standards

Upon final review of all documentation, there was one item of noncompliance with Title 15 regulations discovered at the Shasta County Juvenile Rehabilitation Facility and no items of noncompliance discovered at the River's Edge Academy:

Title 15 § 1354, Separation (c)(e). We reviewed the pod log and performed interviews with youth and staff. In addition, through a review of documentation, SCJRF was unable to provide proof of practice in ensuring that youth who are on Administrative Separation are consistently provided, per Title 15 Regulations, one hour each of programming, recreation, and exercise. Further, it was discovered that youth on Administrative Separation often eat meals in their rooms.

On July 19, 2022, Director Stevens provided the BSCC with a Corrective Action Plan (CAP) that included corrective actions taken. The corrective actions taken included updates to the Administrative Separation (Ad/Sep) and Maximum-Security Risk (MSR) Reintegration Plan policy and procedure. As part of the update, a Reintegration Log tracking form was created and will show each youth's participation in daily programming, including school. The Reintegration Log will be checked daily by the shift supervisor a minimum of every 4-hours to assess a youth on Ad/Sep and or MSR programs. The assessment made by the supervisor shall be documented on the Reintegration Plan form. The Reintegration Log will ensure that all programing requirements are met. We appreciate Director Steven's prompt responses and correction to all items of concern.

As of the date of this letter, the Shasta County Juvenile Rehabilitation Facility has no outstanding items of non-compliance remaining.

To ensure compliance with Title 15 Regulations and to ensure procedures and practices are consistent with policies, the inspection process included, but was not limited to, substantial reviews of incident reports, grievances, admissions and classification documents, room confinement procedures, safety check documentation, case plans, and disciplinary reports and their findings. The inspection process also included interviewing youth, staff, and collaborative partners.

¹ BSCC reviews only those policy and procedures required by, and applicable to, Title 15, CCR. BSCC staff do not "approve" policies and procedures or assess them for constitutional or legal issues. Agencies should seek review through their legal advisor, risk manager, and other persons deemed appropriate for such evaluation.

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Please refer to the Title 15 Procedures checklists for a summary of all relevant minimum standards, indication of compliance or noncompliance, and information that was used to determine compliance.

LOCAL INSPECTIONS

In addition to the biennial inspection, Title 15, Section 1313 and its authorizing statute also require local inspections conducted by the following local authorities:

Throughout the inspection, we had the opportunity to discuss several policies and procedures with Director Stevens along with detention staff. In doing so, we provided insight that may bring clarity and specificity to the facility's policy and procedure manual.

At the onset of the inspection, we were able to assess that the COVID-19 pandemic had a significant effect on administrative processes. Specifically, Division Director Stevens expressed that due to COVID-19 no contact mandates, the evaluation of the educational services and facilities by the education partners, per Title 15 regulation § 1313, did not occur as regularly prescribed for 2020 and 2021. On March 29, 2022, an evaluation of educational services and facilities was performed per Title 15 Regulations. Due to being implemented in 2021, an evaluation of River's Edge Academy was not required for 2020. We understand that local agency scheduling and presence is beyond your agency's control. However, we recommend encouraging facility partners to perform virtual reviews and or desk audits when medical contact mandates prevent onsite in-person inspection.

We offered SCJRF and REA insight in areas that were compliant with Title 15 regulations minimum standards, but could also benefit from best practice recommendations, particularly as they relate to proof of practice. These items included, but were not limited to, policy and procedure formulation, documentation procedures, emergency procedures, room confinement, Ad/Sep, Institutional Assessment Plan, safety checks, etc.

We found that the facility offers a wide array of programming offered by both local community-based services agencies and by Probation Staff. Regular programs include Victor Support Services: ART, REMI VISTA, INC: MRT, Northern Valley Catholic Social Services: Girls Circle and Boys Counsel, Northern Valley Catholic Social Services: Project Toward No Drug Abuse, Northern California Alcoholics Anonymous: AA, Leaders of Tomorrow, Book Club, The Grow Program, and Journaling. These positive, evidence-based programs are well received by the youth and keep the youth in a positive space and outside of their rooms.

Title 24, CCR Physical Plant

From a physical plant and living space area aspect, the youths' rooms and shower areas were properly maintained and in good working order. The youths' also have ample space for programming and recreational activities indoors and outdoors.

There were no changes made to the physical plant and your rated capacity remains at 90 overall. With the addition of the Secure Youth Track Facility, the rated capacity for the entire campus is as follows:

SCJRF: 58REA (camp): 30

SYTF: 2

There are no outstanding items of noncompliance with Title 24 minimum standards.

Training

According to the most recent Standards and Training for Corrections audit, Shasta County Juvenile Rehabilitation Facility and River's Edge Academy camp both are in compliance with all relevant regulations and mandates and mitigating circumstances if applicable.

<u>Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act (JJDPA) Compliance Monitoring</u>
We reviewed applicable documentation for the inspection cycle and found no violations of the JJDPA. Please refer to Title 15 Procedures checklist for detailed information.

I would like to acknowledge Division Director Carla Stevens and her hard work in preparing for the inspection. Director Stevens was challenged with preparing for the inspection in an unfamiliar format of uploading many documents to BSCC. I cannot leave out Senior Juvenile Detention Officer, Mark Schaible, who was integral in uploading an array of documents as well as, working outside of his normal shift to be available to answer inquiries that may arise. Supervisor Danielle Goodwine made herself available if needed. Lastly, I would like to thank JDO Michael Biggers who escorted me on a facility tour and provided valuable insight regarding facility operations.

Director Stevens and your staff were good hosts and open to technical assistance and recommendations that we provided. Your collaborative partners are very passionate about working with the youth and speak highly of youth relationships with facility staff.

This concludes the 2020-2022 biennial inspection report. I am available to assist as needed and happy to provide technical assistance when requested. I look forward to continuing to work together.
