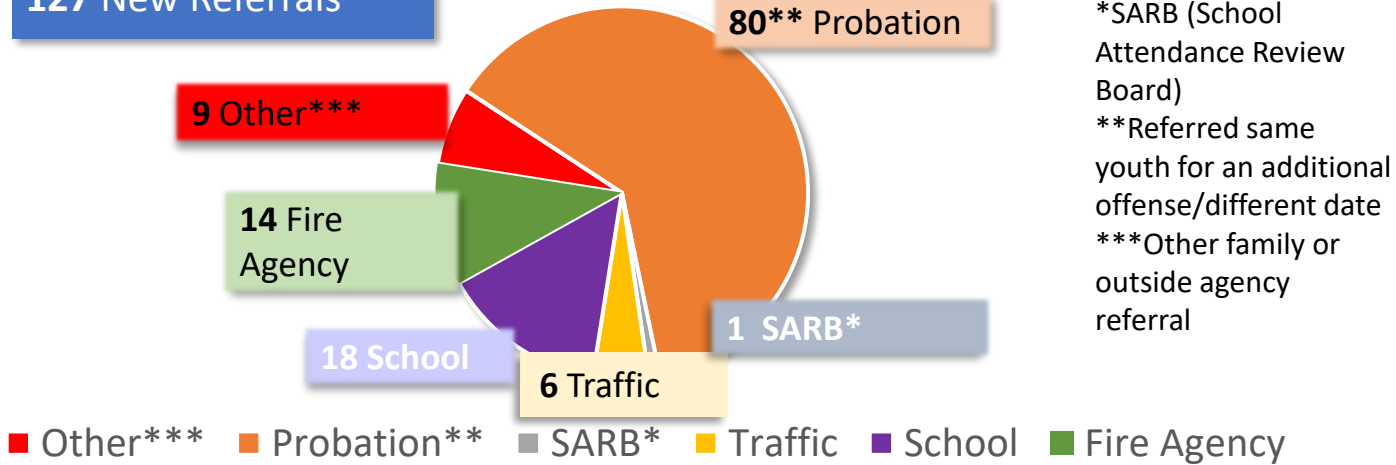

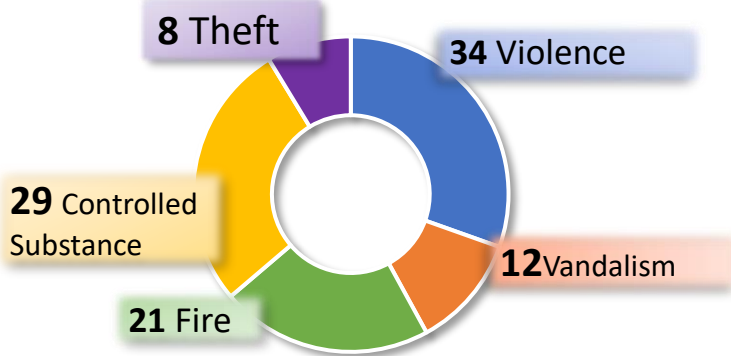

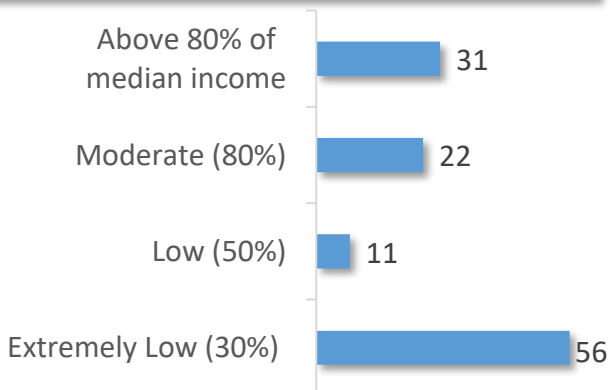
Top 5 Types & Number of Offenses



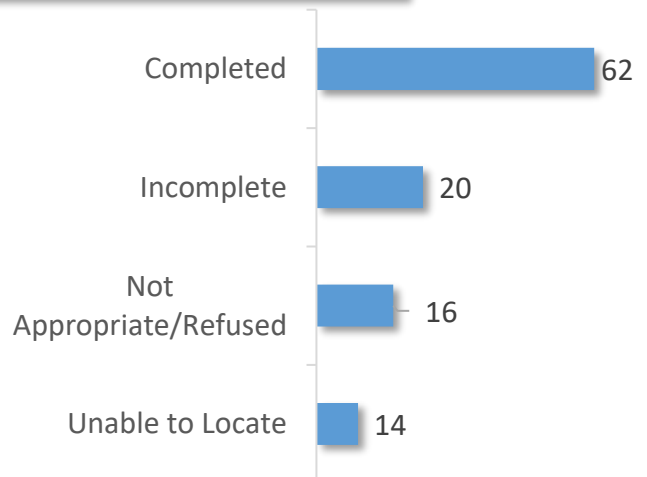

Youth Peer Court



There is a lot of training involved for the volunteers to learn about restorative justice, trauma informed care, and Developmental Relationships. Peer Court volunteers learn how to ask curious questions and determine a plan for the responding youth to repair the harm done to the community and/or victim.

Local judges and attorneys help with the training as well as veteran youth volunteers and Youth Options Shasta staff.
